In the process of making his tree, Troy Welty discovered that the bottom two levels of the tree need to have the pieces cut wider at the base

than shown on the pattern. If you've already cut your glass, there is a workaround for making the bottom rows more angled.

### **Classes**

Other classes are Basic Fusing, Beadmaking, Wire-Wrap Jewelry, Angel Building, Advanced Stepping Stone, Beginning Stained Glass, Better Techniques, and Mosaics. ### **Tree Ideas**

#### Unleash your creativity!

And what a color palate to choose from. Green, definitely. All the glass manufacturers seem to make at least one green. Do you want something easy to cut like Spectrum? Or do you want to buy a piece of art glass that is so difficult to cut that you'd only want to cut it with a saw? Are you looking for texture? Beardens has one green sample that looks like a piece of material all gathered up. The green Silvercoats is beautiful. Iridescent green is always striking. Chartreuse is the fad color this year.

How about a silver tree that harkens back to the 60s? You could use mirror or you could use Silvercoats. Don't forget a color wheel for shining blue, yellow, red and green lighting onto your silver tree.

Wouldn't a white tree be beautiful? White would look really good with any color lights that you'd put up inside of it. You could fuse on decorations or frit. Can't you just envision a white tree with dichroic glass fused onto it?

How about a black tree with white polka dots fused on? Or a pink tree? Or an etched tree? Attach some jump rings and hang tiny ornaments. Let your imagination go!

## Sandblasting

### Do-It-Yourself

Vicki Pavne had a recent show on sandblasting. She made a blast cabinet out of a large Sterlite storage container, which is made of see-through plastic. She cut two holes in one side of the storage container so she could reach inside to hold her glass in one hand and her blaster in the other. She replaced the storage container's lid with a flat piece of tempered glass. The blaster she used was part of a kit that also included the abrasive and resist with precut patterns. She connected the blaster to a regular air compressor that you can buy at a local retailer such as Sears. You can make a fancier blast cabinet. Or, buy one. You can get a new tabletop model online at eBay for less than \$200. Or pay significantly more for a larger cabinet.
