The Harvard Glass Flowers

Harvard Museum of Natural History

The museum's website states: "One of the Museum's most famous treasures is the internationally acclaimed Ware Collection of Blaschka Glass Models of Plants, the "Glass Flowers". This unique collection of over 4,000 modelssome 3,000 on display was created by the glass artisans, Leopold Blaschka and his son, Rudolph. The commission began in 1886, continued for five decades, and represents more than 830 plant species."

The Glass Flowers are on permanent exhibit in the Glass Flowers room, located directly across the hall from the Museum Shop. The flowers were commissioned by Harvard University as a teaching aid. The flowers continue

to amaze due to the fact that they are so botanically accurate and realistic. Many find it unbelievable that they are glass.

The Harvard Museum of Natural History is located at 26 Oxford Street in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Style 487

Free Microsoft Clip Art

At office.microsoft.com/en-us/ clipart/default.aspx in the top left corner of the page, you see the words Clip Art and a box underneath filled with the words Search All Media Types. Click in that box, type Style 487, and click the search button next to it. As you scroll through the pages of resulting images, notice many that look like paint-by-number pictures, making them good to use as a mosaic pattern. Click in the check mark box below the images you want. To download to your computer, click on the Download Item button on the far left of the screen in the Selection Basket section. A Download page appears with the remaining instructions for downloading the selected clip art to your computer.

To open the clip art on your computer, open a program such as Microsoft Word. Open a new document. Click on Insert, Picture, Clip Art. In the search box, type in a descriptive word for the particular image you are looking for. When the image results appear, scroll down to find the image you want. Click on the image and it will insert itself into your document.

To resize the document image, click on the image and little black resizing boxes will appear in the corners and on the sides. Click down and drag on a corner to resize the image while keeping the same proportions.

Candleshelter

Paper Pattern

Use a piece of paper as your template. Cut it to the size of the candleshelter. Lay your paper down on the tabletop, draw a pattern on it if desired, and put your pieces of glass on it. Once you have your glass placed just right, transfer the glass pieces to the candleshelter.
